Washington is in the midst of a child care crisis. Why? Child care is expensive and unaffordable for many working families. At the same time, some child care providers cannot afford to stay in business.

High-quality child care and early learning is the best investment the state can make, yet less than one percent of the budget is dedicated to early learning. With smart, strategic investments, Washington can ensure families have access to the child care they need to work, while their children receive the quality early learning they need to be ready for kindergarten.

Child Care Aware of Washington calls on the 2019 State Legislature to:

- Approve HB 1391 and restore \$37.4 million in funding for Early Achievers
- Invest \$166 million into Working Connections Child Care in order to expand access to quality child care for our vulnerable families
- Approve HB 1344, the WA CAN Act
- Implement the recommendations of the Department of Children, Youth, and Families Compensation Technical Workgroup
- Make targeted investments for families with unique challenges by approving SB 5820 (homeless child care), implementing supports for child care programs serving children with behavioral needs and investing \$2.2 million into play & learn groups for Family, Friend and Neighbor caregivers
