

Child Care in

Washington State

Statewide during the past 12 years, capacity has continued to rise while the total number of child care providers has decreased. The increases in capacity are a result of more family child care closures and larger centers opening. From 2010 to 2023 we have gained over 20,000 slots and decreased by 1,700 family child care providers and 300 centers.

The trend of less providers and more capacity being available at large centers has contributed to child care deserts, as the number of child care locations has decreased. Moreover, communities across the state have experienced differential outcomes in child care availability as some areas experienced greater child care decreases and in some cases lowered capacity. Center-based slots now make up almost 80% of the total child care capacity (not including school-age only programs). The cost of care at center-based programs is significantly higher than family child care homes, resulting in a smaller percentage of the overall capacity being more affordable for families.


The sharpest decrease in provider counts and capacity was from 2010 to 2014. Capacity hit its lowest point in 2014. Since 2014, provider counts have continued to decline at a lesser rate and capacity has generally been increasing. Most recently, capacity declined slightly in 2020, stabilized in 2021, and has increased by 10,000 slots since 2022. Washington has seen an increase of over 500 family child care programs and 70 centers since 2022. Current gains in providers are encouraging, however we continue to have significantly less providers than 12 years ago and the proportion of family child care slots to center-based slots continues to be much lower than in 2010.




In Washington State, the number of child care providers has increased from 5,535 with capacity for 180,267 children in 2019, to 5,862 providers with capacity for 197,425 children in December of 2023.*

Early Achievers is Washington's Quality Recognition and Improvement System (QRIS), which gives training, technical assistance, coaching, awards, scholarships, and other benefits to child care providers to improve the quality of their care.

Statewide, 4,628 child care providers participate in Early Achievers.

Approximately 75% of licensed child care providers in WA are enrolled in Early Achievers, serving over 68,000 children*. Early Achievers provides families with valuable child care program quality recognition information so they can make informed child care choices.



Helping Families Find Child Care in 2023


In 2023, Child Care Aware of Washington programs have helped 12,199 families find child care providers matching their unique needs.
